Corolla SEAL Program (Safety Education & Aquatic Learning) for kids.

It promotes ocean safety through education. This program is a two hour mini-camp on the beach that allows kids to interact with their local lifeguards to learn about and help create a safer beach environment. Focusing on three main factors that contribute to a safe ocean experience: the ocean environment, basic first-aid, and good health choices.

Offered every Tuesday and Wednesday from 11am-2pm, kids can come and paint a horse. Pet a Spanish Mustang on Wednesdays from 11am-2pm as well! Tour the Wild Horse Museum and learn about the wild Colonial Spanish Mustangs that roam Corolla.
